

The author of the Letter to the Hebrews instructs us this week to "not disdain the discipline of the Lord or lose heart when reproved by him. . ." He goes on to explain that: ". . . for whom the Lord loves, he disciplines; he scourges every son he acknowledges."

We are children of God because we share in the divine nature of Jesus the Son of God. Thus, we should expect that God the Father will discipline us out of love. We must endure our trials as discipline from God, our heavenly Father, that same Father that we invoke when we say "Our Father. . ."

When we think of the discipline of a father, we usually think of corporal punishment, but this is not primarily how God disciplines us. Rather, God disciplines us according to the "discipline of love."

The Christian life is a friendship with God wherein we step outside ourselves and love God, not for our own sake, but for His sake. We also love with a passionate love all those good things that we can direct to God's glory. We try to view the world in the way that God views the world, love as God loves, and feel as Sacred Scripture metaphorically describes God as feeling. For example, we feel sorrow for sinners and rejoice in what God is said to rejoice over, such as the conversion of sinners.

Rightly ordered love brings us outside of ourselves to live for God and to seek those good things of the world, not to bring them back into ourselves, but to direct them to God for His greater glory.

Discipline always involves suffering to correct faults and ensure good behavior. However, the suffering of God's discipline is not primarily physical suffering—it is the suffering of the bride in the Song of Songs who desperately looks for her absent bridegroom: "Daughters of Jerusalem, I charge you— if you find my beloved, what will you tell him? Tell him I am faint with love." (Song of Songs 5:8) When our beloved is not present, we experience a suffering called "languor," which is a suffering experienced when the person we love is not present with us. The more we love someone, the more we suffer by their not being present with us. I think that our experience of separation from loved ones due to the COVID-19 pandemic has given us all a taste of

The experience of languor produces another experience called "fervor." When the person we love is not present, we are filled with fervor to be present with our beloved, like the bride in the Song of Songs. I recall here a story of how the Dominican Sisters in Canada and the United States had a picnic together on the US-Canada border during COVID, with each group staying on their appropriate side. Here we can see why love is often described as a blazing fire: we are filled with great fervor to be with the person we love even if it means undergoing trials.

God primarily disciplines us by making us experience the suffering of languor. We suffer the spiritual absence of God, which increases our fervor to seek God. This fervor melts our

heart, turning our heart of stone into a heart of flesh, which makes our heart soft and receptive to God's presence. We thus experience more joy when the Lord becomes present to us again because we have a greater capacity to receive Him. This is the explanation for spiritual dryness. If we have been negligent in our life of prayer, God will become absent to motivate us to seek Him more fervently. Even if we have been faithful to fostering our interior life, God will sometimes depart to purify our selfishness through the suffering of languor, thereby enkindling our fervor to seek God more intensely and selflessly.

Indeed, as Saint Paul remarks: ". . .at the time, all discipline seems a cause not for joy but for pain, yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it."
