### Dear Parishioners:

Bearing wrongs patiently is one of the most difficult works of mercy that we are asked to practice as Christians. Certainly there are times when we ought not. However, knowing when it is right to bear a wrong and when it is right to fight or flee can be challenging. For instance, when you are being robbed at gunpoint, what do you do? Do you suffer the wrong of being robbed or do you fight against the injustice? The virtue of prudence helps a lot in these instances. While one might consider himself capable of disarming a thief due to watching the most recent Jason Bourne movie or a rabbit hole of YouTube self-defense videos, I doubt that many us have honed the skills necessary to do this effectively. Chances are, if you don't endure the indignity you'll lose more than just your wallet or your purse.

In a similar vein there are times in life when we must endure what we think is the wrong decision of others whether that be the Pope, the President, or even the local priest. Yet, if we are not in a position to change the mind of the person in authority, what then, are we to do? Should we fight, should we flee, or should we just bear the perceived wrong patiently? Well, here are a few helpful Thomistic rules of thumb to help make such a decision.

First, Aquinas notes that one should only engage in a battle if you have a clear chance at victory. So, if you can't win, you shouldn't fight. Apply this to every analogous situation. Second, we should only flee if you are not fleeing to a more problematic situation. For instance if a person is upset about the liturgical life of the Church it's a poor choice to flee into the arms of an institution that lacks full communion with Christ's very Church. The harm done by disunity is significantly grave.

Given these particular ways to judge a situation it would be clear that if you can't win the fight and your flight away from the wrong will send you off of an objectively worse precipice, then it is the right thing to bear the wrong and to bear it patiently. There is much merit in this work. It's a hard thing to do because it requires us to set aside our own preferences and opinions, well-formed or otherwise. However, in so doing we take upon us the conformity to Christ who suffered his unjust Passion for our sake. By this conformity to Christ we can attain to sanctity.

### **EDITH STEIN: THE SEVENTH CHAMBER**

This is a moving, artistic portrayal of the life of Jewish philosopher, Catholic convert, and Carmelite martyr, Edith Stein. It powerfully captures the interior struggles of this extraordinary woman and her journey toward the Lord. Deeply influenced by the writings of St. Teresa of Avila, she joined the Carmelites, took the name of Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, and was put to death in Auschwitz in 1942.
