Dear Holy Rosary Friends and Families,

"Ecstasy" is not a word that we typically associate with Christianity today. When we think of the word "ecstasy," we often think of the likes of Grace Slick or Janis Joplin instead of the spiritual life. Nonetheless, the word "ecstasy," in its historical usage, signifies a phenomenon of great importance to the spiritual life.

The English word "ecstasy" comes from the Ancient Greek word "ékstasis" (ἔκστἄσῖς), which signifies displacement — something that is put out of place and moved outward from where it is supposed to be.

When used to describe a human experience, the word "ecstasy" signifies how we can come out of ourselves, go beyond ourselves, to be with another person in a most intimate way.

Ecstasy, as a natural capacity, is an everyday phenomenon. Consider how friends come out of themselves to enter into the interior life of their friend. Friends share their hearts with each other and thereby do not simply know and love their friend on a surface level, but see the world from *their friends' perspective* and love them *for who they are as persons*. Friends empathize with each other in such in a way that they become like one self with each other and thus know and love their friend like they know and love themselves.

We can think here of how husband and wife are ideally like one self, not simply physically through a sexual relationship, but spiritually by entering into each other through empathy and love. Husband and wife do not just live together and thus dwell together in a physical manner. They also ideally dwell together in such a manner that they penetrate past the exterior shell of the body of their spouse that they perceive in the world and enter into the interior of that spouse's subjective life. Spouses ought to mutually enter into each other's first-person perspective on the world, or—to use a more profound biblical formulation—into their very heart, which is the core of their being as a person. We call this profound communion a "mutual indwelling" of friends and a "mutual indwelling" of spouses by extension.

It may seem amazing that a person can go outside of their own first-person perspective on the world to enter into the first-person perspective of another. It may seem like magic or something impossible. However, it is possible due to our capacity to experience ecstasy. In ecstasy we are displaced from ourselves and leave ourselves behind to enter into the place where another person experiences the world. We can then love the other person, not simply as a body that we perceive in the world, which is another object (special though it be), but we can love the other from the inside out, so to speak.

On the supernatural level, grace perfects the same natural capacity for ecstasy and allows us to be displaced and come outside of ourselves towards God the divine spouse. Through charity we are friends of God and thus the mutual indwelling between friends is like the mutual indwelling between ourselves and the divine life of God. Our Lord says:

"If a man love Me, he will keep My words; and My Father will love him, and We will come unto him and make Our abode with him." (John 14:23)

Faithfulness is a mark of any friendship and so is trust in the word of our friend. Friends keep their word to each other. Indeed, when we consider the phenomenon of "keeping one's word," we see a dimension of the human being made visible to us—keeping one's word doesn't primarily pertain to what we are but who we are—to our character. We see here the difference between two different questions: "what are you?" and "who are you?" All people are human beings, but not everyone keeps their word, which reflects poorly on who they are despite not fundamentally changing what they are. God keeps his word to us; do we keep our word to God? If we keep our word that we will be faithful to God's words, who we are will also involve who God is. In a profound way, the Holy Spirit leads us outside of ourselves in ecstasy to dwell in the interior of God's divine life. As wayfarers on earth, the mutual indwelling between us and God is imperfect, but in heaven that mutual indwelling will find its perfection in vision, where we will see each other face to face. "My beloved spoke and said to me, 'Arise, my darling, my beautiful one, come with me. See! The winter is past; the rains are over and gone. . . My dove in the clefts of the rock, in the hiding places on the mountainside, show me your face, let me hear your voice; for your voice is sweet, and your face is lovely." (Song of Songs, 2:10-11, 14)
