Dear Holy Rosary Friends and Families,

On Thursday, All Souls Day, we began our time of interceding for the souls in purgatory. Our prayers, through God's plan, are endowed with such effectiveness that even brief invocations such as, *Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them,* bring immense relief and satisfaction for sins. As well, we have the astounding power of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, bringing the greatest consolation and satisfaction possible for us to give. In so many impressive ways can we come to their aid. From the perspective of the suffering souls, this is the great love of God coming to them through us.

In fact, not only in this way, but in every way, they are completely alert to the presence of God's mercy. We don't often think of purgatory and divine love going together. But St. Catherine of Genoa, a lay mystic of the 15th century who was granted special visions of the souls in purgatory, speaks of the keen awareness they have of God's goodness even as they suffer so intensely.

St. Catherine says, ...for while they suffer their torments willingly, they perceive that God has been very good to them, considering what they have deserved and how great are their offences in his eyes. For if his goodness did not temper justice with mercy (satisfying it with the precious blood of Jesus Christ), one sin alone would deserve a thousand hells. They suffer their pains so willingly that they would not lighten them in the least, knowing how justly they have been deserved. They resist the will of God no more than if they had already entered upon eternal life (Life and Doctrine of St. Catherine of Genoa 14).

A remarkable statement that shows how rapidly souls advance in divine love once they pass through their particular judgment and step into this time of purification. These were men and women who, like us, were often hesitant to acknowledge the merciful action of God in our trials. Rather than being thankful for the sufferings of life, they were downcast, or even angry at God. But in purgatory, they see how every trial is for bringing love to its perfection. They want nothing more than to love God in the endurance of their darkness and trial. Which is love of an astounding strength, considering how their suffering is so far beyond even the greatest of pains of this life. As St. Thomas puts it: ...the least pain of purgatory surpasses the greatest pain of this life (ST Appen. 1, Q 2). Despite this, the souls in purgatory love Him with full mind and will and strength, gladly enduring whatever must come.

For this reason, we call the souls in purgatory "holy souls." They are not yet perfect, but they have advanced so far in short time, through the power of divine grace, that they endure the greatest trials with wonderful love and surrender. And, as St. Catherine goes on to say, [they] ...experience... a great and never-failing satisfaction which constantly increases as they approach to God. They see all things, not in themselves nor by themselves, but as they are in God, on whom they are more intent than on their sufferings. For the least vision they

can have of God overbalances all woes and all joys that can be conceived. Yet their joy in God does by no means abate their pain (Life and Doctrine 14).

This last statement is the most important for us. Their pain is so intense, it would be heartless for us not to have deep concern for their plight. Purgatory is a time for them to show their great love for God by enduring whatever He asks of them. But for us as well, they become an occasion to step out in love by praying, offering Masses, and obtaining plenary indulgences on their behalf. Let us make this November once again a time of generous works of mercy for souls most in need of our help!
